Patient Information

Your patch test results indicate that you have a contact allergy to hydroxycitronellal. This contact allergy may cause your skin to react when it is exposed to this substance although it may take several days for the symptoms to appear. Typical symptoms include redness, swelling, itching, and fluid-filled blisters.

Where is hydroxycitronellal found?

Hydroxycitronellal is found in soap, perfumery, cosmetic, and flavoring industries (sweet, rose, fresh floral, lily, linden, blossom).

How can you avoid contact with hydroxycitronellal?
