Patient Information

Your patch test results indicate that you have a contact allergy to geraniol. This contact allergy may cause your skin to react when it is exposed to this substance although it may take several days for the symptoms to appear. Typical symptoms include redness, swelling, itching, and fluid-filled blisters.

Where is geraniol found?

Geraniol is found in plant-based mosquito repellents. It has a rose-like odor, for which it is commonly used in perfumes and in products with flavors such as peach, raspberry, grapefruit, red apple, plum, lime, orange, lemon, watermelon, pineapple, and blueberry.

How can you avoid contact with geraniol?

Avoid products that list any of the following names in the ingredients:
